Celebrating 86 Years of Service to Grays Harbor

The story of public power began as an idea to bring electricity to all people in Washington State, not just those residing within city limits. In Grays Harbor, the journey began in the legislature and on the streets in 1938. Building off the momentum of People's Initiative No. 1 which allowed PUD's to be formed in rural communities, the voters of Grays Harbor authorized the formation of the PUD in November of 1938. After 14 months of negotiation and organization, the Grays Harbor PUD officially took over the power business in Aberdeen and Hoquiam from Grays Harbor Railway and Light in January of 1940. In 1998, the utility introduced wholesale telecommunications services, providing the infrastructure for the growing telecommunications industry.

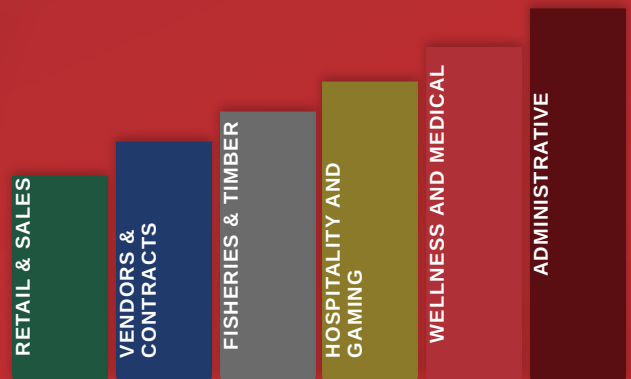
The Quinault Indian Nation, together with Quinault Nation Enterprises, is one of the major employers in Grays Harbor County. Collectively, the Nation and its Enterprises support approximately 1,500 jobs with government employment and employment of wholly owned and joint venture companies.

Additionally, the enterprises that support QIN (vendors, contractors, outsourced work) are estimated to employ another 800 people in Grays Harbor County alone. And these businesses support even more jobs outside of the county.
